Latest COVID numbers a mixed bag for Sask.

Monday marked the Regina region's third straight day without reporting a new case of COVID-19, while the continues to average fewer new cases (7.26) of COVID-19 rest of the province combined to report 145 new cases

Even with last week's outbreaks however, the province per day since June 8 — when bars, restaurants, daycares, gyms, churches, parks and playgrounds were all permitted to reopen — than it did in the previous 88 days (7.38 cases per day) dating back to Saskatchewan's first reported case.

Testing meanwhile continues to lag well behind the national average, though the government said that the 2,634 tests performed Saturday and Sunday represented the province's highest two-day total of the pandemic. As of Monday, the government reported 82,943 COVID-19 tests had been performed in Saskatchewan, for a per-capita rate of 60,463 per million people. Nationally, the average was 93,658 people tested per million population.

over the nine days dating back to July 12.

Province-wide, those numbers included 42 new cases July 15, the highest single-day increase in cases since the virus was first confirmed in Saskatchewan in March.

Factoring in recoveries during that time, the total active number of COVID cases in Saskatchewan increased from 40 on July 11 to 145 as of Monday afternoon.

The provincial government resumed daily COVID updates July 12 following a call to do so from the provincial NDP. The government had temporarily stopped providing updates on weekends and holidays.

The government noted Monday that the recent increase in cases continues to be found largely in the southwest and west-central areas of the province, "both on colonies and in the broader community."

As of July 15, the Saskatchewan Health Authority noted there continued to be an elevated risk of COVID transmission in Swift Current, as well as within the rural municipalities of Maple Creek, Auvergne, Biggar, Eagle Creek,
